

"Hirapura Bus Terminal Set to Commence Operations on August 15th"

Shreya Guha, Additional Chief Secretary of the Transport and Road Safety Department, and Chairperson of the Rajasthan State Bus Terminal Development Authority, has authorized the commencement of bus operations from the Hirapura Bus Terminal on Ajmer Road starting August 15, following instructions from Chief Minister Bhajanlal Sharma. She has instructed officials to ensure all necessary arrangements are in place. Additionally, Mrs. Guha directed Jaipur City Transport Services Limited (JCTL) officials to extend city transport services to Hirapura from various parts of the city.

Mrs. Guha chaired a meeting at the Transport Headquarters on Tuesday with officials from Traffic Police, JCTL, Transport Department, and Roadways to discuss the operations at Hirapura Bus Terminal. She emphasized the importance of implementing the prepared roadmap by all stakeholder departments to facilitate essential infrastructure. Mrs. Guha emphasized that the Jaipur Development Authority (JDA) should expedite the development of basic facilities such as ticket counters, shelters, drinking water facilities, and toilets for the convenience of passengers and smooth bus operations.




Plantation of saplings in Aranya Bhavan

Kiran has showcased her art at more than forty art institutions of which two dozen were international. Her artworks "NREGA" and "Pooja Times' and 'Shelters' were exhibited at the Louvre, Paris in 2012, 2013 and 2017

domain accomplishments. As Director General of Jaipur's leading cultural center she has organized many fes-

Untapped Tourism Potential in Bilara



Jodhpur, July 10

ilara holds immense potential for tourism development. boasting numerous forts, citadels, palaces, mansions, ancient chhatris, and significant buildings. Additionally, its religious sites are both nationally and recognized internationally. Despite its rich heritage, Bilara sees few tourists. Discussions about developing the tourism industry in the district have been ongoing for years, but tangible progress is lacking. Instructions from the District Collector to Tourism Department officials often go unheeded, leaving tourist sites waiting for visitors. A key issue is the absence of tourism department officials stationed in Bilara.

Key Tourist Sites in Bilara

Bilara is home to a plethora of tourist attractions, many of which have gained national and international recognition. Highlights include:

- Kalpavriksha of Bilara headquarters
- Historical Aai Mataji Temple
- Harsha Deval
- Banganga
- Raja Bali Temple
- Nathdwara

Surrounding Bilara, there are numerous ancient, religious, and cultural sites such as:

- · Satiji's Temple in Bala Village
- Mataji's Temple in Padasala Village
- Khejarla Fort in Khejarla Village
- Bhesad Mataji Temple Monument

Developing these sites could generate revenue for the government and provide employment for locals. Many countries have achieved developed status primarily through their tourism industries.

Historical Significance of Bilara

Bilara has historical ties to the demon king, King Bali, who is said to have ruled the area and performed a significant yagya in Pichiyak, creating the site known as "Ghee Talai." Legends tell of God taking three giant steps to measure Bali's kingdom, ultimately sending him to hell. An ancient temple dedicated to King Bali remains in Pichiyak, with the Sargara community continuing to worship it. The site of Banganga, recognized as a pilgrimage site, is where King Bali is believed to have brought water from the under-



world

Additionally, the fair of Nine Sati, now called the fair of Gangamai, commemorates the sati of King Virochan's nine queens. Bilara also features the Kalpavriksha, sent by God as a reward for King Bali's sacrifice, and

the ancient Harsha Deval temple, built by King Harshvardhan.

Need for Tourism Department Presence

Despite its tourism potential, Bilara lacks an operational office for the tourism department. Establishing such an office could help develop tourist circuits in Bilara and surrounding

villages. Given Bilara's strategic location between Ajmer, Jodhpur, and Pali, tourists visiting these cities could be encouraged to stop in Bilara. The presence of tourism department officials could drive significant progress.

Bilara's historical and cultural heritage offers vast potential for tourism development. While the tourism department office's status remains unclear, establishing it could spearhead efforts to promote Bilara's rich tourist sites and harness its full potential.

MARWARI CUISINE

The Cultural Significance of Gatte ki Sabzi

Ingredients and Preparation: Gatte ki Sabzi comprises two main components: the gatta (besan dumplings) and the gravy. The dumplings are made from a mixture of gram flour, yogurt, and spices, while the gravy is yogurt-based and infused with aromatic spices.

- Gram flour (besan) (1 cup)
- Yogurt (2 tablespoons)
- Oil (1 tablespoon)
- Turmeric powder (1/4 teaspoon)
- Red chili powder (1/4 teaspoon)
- Salt (to taste)
- Water (as needed)

Ingredients for Gravy:

- Oil or ghee (2 tablespoons)
- Cumin seeds (1 teaspoon)
- Asafoetida (hing) (a pinch)
- Onion, finely chopped (1 medium), Ginger-garlic paste (1 teaspoon)
- Yogurt, whisked (1 cup)
- Turmeric powder (1/2 spoon)
- ullet Red chili powder (1 teaspoon)
- Coriander powder (1 tablespoon), • Garam masala (1/2 teaspoon), • Salt (to taste)
- Water (as needed)
- · Fresh coriander leaves,
- chopped (for garnishing)

atte ki Sabzi is a cherished dish in the vibrant culinary landscape of Rajasthan, a state in western India known for its rich history, stunning architecture, and colourful culture. This vegetarian delicacy, consisting of gram flour (besan) dumplings cooked in a spiced yogurt-based gravy, is a testament to the resourcefulness and creativity of the people of Rajasthan who have adapted their cooking techniques to thrive in the region's arid climate.

The scarcity of fresh vegetables and fruits in the desert areas of Rajasthan has led to the development of a cuisine that relies on grains, pulses, and dried vegetables. Gatte ki Sabzi is a prime example of this resource-fulness, as it uses gram flour, a staple ingredient in Indian cuisine, to create a nourishing and flavourful dish that does not depend on the availability of fresh produce.

Gatte ki Sabzi holds a special place in the hearts of the people of Rajasthan, as it is not only enjoyed by locals but also highly sought after by visitors who want to experience the region's unique flavours. The dish is often featured in traditional Rajasthani thalis (platters) and is enjoyed during festive (Continued on page 6)

Preparation:

- 1. Prepare the gatta dough by mixing gram flour, yogurt, oil, turmeric powder, red chili powder, and salt in a bowl. Add water gradually, as needed, to form a firm dough. Rest the dough for 10–15 minutes.
- 2. Divide the dough into equal portions and shape them into cylindrical rolls, about 1/2 inch in diameter. Boil water in a large pot and cook the gatta rolls for about 10 minutes, or until they float to the surface. Remove the gattas from the water, let them cool, and cut them into 1/2-inch pieces. Reserve the cooking water for the gravy.
- 3. Heat oil or ghee in a pan and add cumin seeds and asafoetida. Once the seeds start to crackle, add the chopped onion and cook until translucent. Stir in the ginger-garlic paste and cook for another 2 minutes.
- 4. Lower the heat and carefully add the whisked yogurt to the pan, stirring constantly to prevent curdling.
- 5. Add turmeric powder, red chili powder, coriander powder, garam masala, and salt to the yogurt mixture. (\$\circ\$Continued on page 6)
